The idea of doing an international nursing externship, has always appealed to me since the start of nursing school here at San Diego State University. In my last semester of nursing school, I was excited to see that my wishes came true, when our school partnered with the Spirit of Life Foundation, to send two students to Salta, Argentina. I feel that one of the most rewarding aspects of the program is that you experience the culture and healthcare system of a different country. I had the benefit of being a Latino student already, so this helped me improve my medical Spanish as well as my conversational Spanish. I feel that working with people that have so little, you get back to the basics of nursing from its infancy. I was happy to support patients without the fear of offending anybody. I was able to give a warn touch, hug, and kiss cheek to cheek. It made me feel as if the patients were treated more like family and not just a person in a bed suffering from an illness. I found it intriguing that nurses, here in this country still run hospitals efficiently with little to no resources; just good old motherly care, getting patients out of bed, providing fresh air, and medicine.

My journey in Salta was an enjoyable one. I realized that I came back home with more of a "reverence for life" as quoted from the famous Dr. A. Schweitzer.
